

Immunization Compliance Waiver Hepatitis B, Measles, Mumps, and Rubella

Oklahoma Statutes, Title 70 §3244, requires that all students who enroll as a full-time or part-time student in an Oklahoma public or private postsecondary institution provide documentation of vaccination against Hepatitis B, Measles, Mumps and Rubella.

The statute requires that Institutions notify students of the vaccination requirements and provide students with educational information concerning Hepatitis B, Measles, Mumps and Rubella, including the risks and benefits of the vaccination.

The statute permits that when the vaccine is medically contraindicated and a licensed physician has signed a written statement to that effect, such students shall be exempt from the vaccination. Further, the statute permits a student to sign a written waiver stating that the administration of the vaccine conflicts with the student's moral or religious tenets.

Immunization Education Information Sheet for College Students

MEASLES, MUMPS, RUBELLA (MMR) VACCINE

Benefits: Vaccines and high rates of vaccination have made these diseases much less common in the United States. Before vaccines, these diseases were very common in the United States, especially among children. They are still common in many parts of the world.

Risks: Most people who get MMR vaccine do not have any problems with it. After MMR vaccination, a person might experience:

Minor events: Sore arm from the injection, fever, redness or rash at the injection site, swelling of glands in the cheeks or neck. If these events happen, they usually begin within 2 weeks after the shot. They occur less often after the second dose.

Moderate events: Seizure (jerking or staring) often associated with fever, temporary pain and stiffness in the joints, mostly in teenage or adult women, Temporary low platelet count, which can cause unusual bleeding or bruising, rash all over body.

Severe events occur very rarely: Deafness, long-term seizures, coma, or lowered consciousness, brain damage. For more information, visit: www.cdc.gov/vaccinesafety/

HEPATITIS B VACCINE

Benefits: Hepatitis B vaccine can prevent hepatitis B and its consequences, including liver cancer and cirrhosis. **Risks:** With any medicine, including vaccines, there is a chance of side effects. These are usually mild and go away on their own, but serious reactions are also possible. Most people who get hepatitis B vaccine do not have any problems with it.

Minor problems following hepatitis B vaccine include: Soreness where the shot was given, temperature of 99.9°F or higher. If these problems occur, they usually begin soon after the shot and last 1 or 2 days. Your doctor can tell you more about these reactions.

MENINGITIS

Oklahoma law require that first time enrollees who reside in on-campus student housing be vaccinated against meningococcal disease Unless: 1) the individual signs a waiver that he/she has chosen not to be immunized or, 2) in the case of a minor, the individual's parent or legal guardian signs the waiver. More Information about the Meningitis Vaccine and the Meningitis Waiver can be obtained at the Housing Office.

Housing Students must provide a copy of immunization records to the Admission Office and the Student Housing Office.

The Oklahoma Health Department requires that TB testing be conducted in the United States (NO Exceptions).

International Students who provide immunization records from their home country must be translated into English.

Students attending at the MSC Ardmore branch and the main campus need to provide a copy of immunization records to the Admission Office in Tishomingo.
